Leadership Development occurs organically within the ministry of Sustainable Liberia. The development of leaders begins with relationships built in the village, and also through job training programs. As the seeds of hope are planted and nurtured, they begin to flourish in the hearts of Liberians who begin to dream about ways they can make a difference in their community. Thus, leaders are identified across all areas of ministry.

We discover people who have the desire and capacity to further their education and return to their community to serve. Whether it is agriculture, business, nursing, or teaching, we scholarship these students and look forward to their impact when they return to the village.

The informal part of leadership development is working with the existing village leaders, as well as those we meet who have a desire to lead, mentor, and serve within the community. By nurturing relationships with these leaders, we are able to recognize their needs and those within their sphere of influence. In turn, this allows us to connect them with other leaders who are local or visiting. Often, we find these relationships develop rapidly and leaders grow into mentors who share their valuable expertise and experience.

Infrastructure RESTORATION

Infrastructure Restoration develops as an outflow of other areas of ministry to help support and sustain the community. Many infrastructure projects have emerged as a need over the years due to relationships built and maintained in the villages. We always partner with local leadership, villagers, and contractors.

EDUCATION & JOB TRAINING

Liberia's education system continues to struggle after the civil war that ended in 2004. The country currently suffers a massive shortage of trained teachers; especially teachers who are willing to relocate and teach in rural communities. Amidst these challenges, some teachers are committed to the teaching profession and volunteer their time to teach even without pay, many with very little education or resources of their own.

Sustainable Liberia supports the recruitment and training of much-needed teachers by mobilizing financial, human, and other resources to support primary schools in rural Liberia. Teacher workshops are conducted by local and visiting professionals that rapidly improve the skills of new and seasoned teachers.

Because unemployment is still a major issue, vocational and technical education is strongly needed to empower young Liberians who have limited formal education. The Vocational Training Program is designed to help Liberia's hard-to-employ population who desire to enter the workforce or become entrepreneurs. The basic career tracks currently offered include: Agriculture, Food Services, Computer Training, and Drivers Education. Students enrolled in the programs are paired with mentors in their field of study for support, mentoring, and upon graduation an internship program to help them acquire real-world experience.



Derrick is utilizing training he received from a 2017 mission team to make eye glasses for those in need and teach Walk Through the Bible to his Bible study and Sunday School. Derrick travels around to the villages performing eye tests and creating glasses, but he also reaches out to the slum in Monrovia near his church. Economic **EMPOWERMENT**

Economic empowerment is key to developing community sustainability. Our goal is to see rural Liberian villages flourish in freedom, as together we build a sustainable infrastructure. While the economic impact provides jobs for employees, income for families, and industry for the community, a Christ-focused ministry is provided to everyone.

An example of Economic Empowerment in action is the Brendi Cocoa Company and its far-reaching impact. In 2017, a co-operative agreement was developed with the village farmers of Gbansue and the surrounding area. Brendi purchases their cocoa at fair market value and provides the initial tools, training, and resources to produce a quality harvest. A processing facility was built, where the cocoa is now dried and stored for sale and distribution. Profits from cocoa sales are invested back into the company and redistributed into community infrastructure and education.

The entire process, from planting to distribution to accounting and sales, is run and managed by and for Liberians. In fact, you may recognize Monica, Jutomu, and Christopher, all of whom received educational scholarships from Sustainable Liberia. You believed in them and invested in their United Methodist University in education. Now, each one Liberia. Jutomu is from the village of Balama and received a scholarship to attend Cuttington University, a nearby private school. He graduated in 2013 with a degree in Public Administration, and beginning in 2017, he helped launch the Brendi Cocoa Company. His background in community development has enabled him to build key relationships with village elders, leaders, and farmers to set up co-ops for the cocoa business. Jutomu works with the farmers to fulfill their agreements and continues to engage new farmers to grow the business.

> Christopher is a 2013 Cuttington University graduate who received a Sustainable Liberia scholarship. He studied both Chemistry and Agriculture and is now a leader at the Brendi Cocoa Company. Christopher oversees the farmers to assist with crop growth and quality, and mentors them in farming techniques. He is responsible for the quality and oversight of the fermentation and drying of cocoa beans at the processing facility. Christopher also trains villagers in the community gardens, helping them learn how to grow a sustainable source of food for their families.

Should I Use My IRA Required Minimum Distribution To Fund Charitable Giving? by James Underwood CPA, CFP

fter the tax law changes created by the Tax Cuts and Jobs Act of 2017, there were many changes that affect charitable giving. With the increase in the standard deduction, many people who previously itemized their deductions and claimed a tax deduction for gifts to qualified 501(c)(3) charitable organizations will no longer itemize and will lose the tax benefit from the gift. If you will be taking the standard deduction, you can still receive a tax benefit from your charitable gift by making a Qualified Charitable Distribution (QCD) from your IRA account.

A QCD is a distribution from your IRA account that is transferred directly to a charity. In order to qualify as a QCD and not have the IRA distribution included in your Adjusted Gross Income (AGI), there are a few specific rules. You must be 70 ½ or older to be eligible, and the maximum that you can donate is \$100,000 annually. The IRA distribution check must be made payable directly to the charity and cannot be made payable to the IRA owner and then donated to the charity. An additional item to consider is that the distribution can count towards your Required Minimum Distribution (RMD) for the year as long as it is made before the RMD is satisfied.

To complete a QCD, check with your IRA custodian about their procedure. Some custodians will provide you with a checkbook so that you can write the check directly to the charity from your IRA account. Other custodians require you to fill out an IRA distribution form where you can have them make the check payable directly to the charity. In both cases, make sure no money is withheld for taxes since the distribution will not be taxable.

A QCD can be a good option for someone who meets the distribution criteria and gives to charity but will take the standard deduction. For someone who will itemize their deductions, it may be a good solution if you need to minimize your AGI to stay under certain thresholds for Medicare or Net Investment Income Tax purposes. As with any tax decision, please consult your tax advisor before making any final decisions.



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
